A PRIEST'S PONDERINGS...

For whatever reason, I have been obsessed with the differences in the birth narratives in Matthew and Luke this year. Not really useful for preparing a simple message for a family service! I can identify more with the experience of preparing for birth in a safe home, which is what Matthew portrays, than a long required walk or donkey ride (there's actually no donkey now in either gospel!) in the last month of pregnancy. And with the preparations and changes in the prospective parents (I'm sure my husband and I gathered more stuff for the baby than Mary or Joseph dreamed possible!!).

In Matthew Mary is "found to be with child by the Holy Spirit." No explanation, and no angel coming to Mary. Mary told Joseph, and Joseph "decided to divorce her quietly" before an angel came to him in a dream and told him to "Be not afraid," which is what angels say to almost everyone they meet, and to take Mary as his wife.

The <u>Salt Project commentary</u> asks an intriguing question. What is more fearful for Joseph: taking a woman who's pregnant by another man or taking a woman who's pregnant by the Holy Spirit? And what about Mary (Matthew pays little attention to her), who either knew the biological father, or was raped by someone against her will, or who found herself pregnant knowing she'd not been with any man? We have no record of the conversations that probably happened (or, perhaps worse, the silences as both parents worried about how to talk about this) as they could watch and feel the baby grow, watch and know the murmurings of the villagers, know their own doubts and fears.

We talk about love incarnate in the birth of Jesus. Look too however at love incarnate in the love of Mary and Joseph, "courageous love". Whether you have ever had a baby, or adopted a child, or started a new career or adventure or path to sobriety or decisions without your lifelong partner, honoring dreams is a risky business. Is this of God or am I crazy? Am I in this alone or do I have human support around me? If I'm working my way out of a choice I now regret or a mess I have made, do I dare trust that God has forgiven me and is blessing this new path?

Until the birth, we only hear of one of Joseph's dreams, the one that led him to accept Mary and her pregnancy. Did the angel come more often or was Joseph otherwise left with just that one clear vision? And what about us, trying to live faithfully, maybe with glimpses of direction in God or prayer or conversation with others but without much

certainty? When and how has love grown in your life? When have dim hopes strengthened your heart, your will, your love for God and yourself and others?

This is the season for us to attend to where courageous love is becoming incarnate in our decisions, actions, and connections. Ana Hernandez has a chant, "When in your heart you make a manger for his birth, then Christ will once again become a child on earth:" a child of hope, of courage, of strength to do the next right thing until the new path becomes clearer. What fears can you hold up to the light of God's love as you prepare to celebrate Christ's birth?

December 21 is a Family Service, and we hear Matthew's version of Jesus' birth. We're going to throw a **baby shower for Jesus**, because in Matthew Jesus was born at home in Bethlehem. Cards will be available for everyone to draw or write something you are doing to prepare your heart for Jesus' birth. Children in church will help set up the nativity and decorate the manger area.
