A PRIEST'S PONDERINGS...

The Rev. Allison Moore

This Sunday's gospel offers a "faith check up" that I have found useful at various points over the years. Find a quiet place, with a journal if you like, and breathe for a few moments.

- 1. "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" This can be "people," sermons or books or conversations about who Jesus is—wonderworker, moral exemplar, savior, hippie, etc.—or it can be different ways you have experienced or named Jesus in your own life. Who was Jesus for you as a child? As someone choosing a career, or raising young children, or in hard or amazingly joyful times?
- 2. "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus asks the disciples, and I can imagine a long silence. Which Peter, as usual, feels compelled to break. Or maybe after walking with Jesus on water and knowing the healings and sermons and conversations, Peter catches a glimpse of Jesus as God and can't be still. Imagine Jesus asking you that question, for ten seconds or 10 hours or somewhere in between. Who is Jesus for you at this time in your life? In the midst of the circumstances of your life and COVID and an election and protests around police brutality and systemic racism? Listen for an answer that comes from your heart now, from God rather than or in addition to "flesh and blood" or intellect.

Imagine Jesus saying to you, "Blessed are	e you,
and on this rock, or	, I will build my church." Who does Jesus
say you are? Who do you know you are in God's e	yes or heart? Simon/Peter/rock can be heard
as Jesus naming the core of Peter, the unique gifts	God gave Peter to build the church. Who
are you beneath the labels of profession or relation	nship or social standing, you and Jesus gazing
at each other? What gift, or fault, because Peter a	nd all of us offer strengths and failings and
often they are intimately connected, has Jesus see	n and named in you at this point in your
development?	

4. And when we are authentically ourselves, disciples building a community around Jesus of love and justice and healing, the gates of hell will not destroy it. When we align ourselves with God, and offer all of who we are, we participate in a community that stretches through time and bridges heaven and earth. Here is the source of strength and courage and

guidance that we need in perilous times. Each of us has keys which can unlock division or unity, peace or war, love or fear—pray for a while about what keys you have and how you can use them.

Isaiah summarizes it well: "Listen to me, you that pursue righteousness, you that seek the Lord. Look to the rock from which you were hewn, and to the quarry from which you were dug." Have a conversation with Jesus, name each other, and discover more of how you are called to work towards the Commonwealth of God on earth.


